The ANGEL Program fulfilled Holy Rosary School's vision of including all children in classroom education, regardless of their learning ability. Designed to offer year round, individualized education in an inclusive classroom setting, the ANGEL Program is the only of its kind in the region to provide the highest quality support available, based upon the principles of Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA), in an inclusive classroom setting. A 4:1 student-teacher ratio is maintained throughout the day.

Both ANGEL Program students and their typical peers benefit from working side-by-side from an early age. Their regular interaction results in increased independence and improved confidence, with peers gaining compassion for and acceptance of their differences.

Autism is the fastest-growing developmental disability in the United States. In 2018, a study by the Health Resources and Services Administration's Maternal and Child Health Bureau (MCHB) reported that about 1 in 40 children has been diagnosed with autism. With the prevalence of ASD diagnoses increasing year over year, having the ANGEL Program in the heart of Memphis is more important than ever.
